## October Speaker Josie Goodenow Gives Us the Buzz About Bees

osie Goodenow has been gardening since she was in the second grade when her father retired from the Air Force and settled in Napa County. She has lived in the Georgetown area of California since 1985, and enjoys being in a Zone 7 growing area, where many plants require a definite winter chill.

With several creeks and ponds on her property and a good well to keep the water table up, she enjoys growing water-thirsty lilacs, peonies, cherry trees (both fruiting and ornamental) asparagus, and strawberries.

As with most gardeners, she also loves to try to grow plants that are hardy outside her growing zone, never really satisfied to follow general gardening rules. She pushes her plants to thrive where they are not acclimated, sometimes successful, and other times learning something new while doing.

When Josie retired in 2008, she joined the California Garden Club, and became President in 2009, then District Director of Golden Foothills District in 2011. She accepted the Bee Chairman position with the CGCI and Pacific Region in 2014, and has given bee programs in several areas of our state.



Did you know that the honey bee isn't a very good pollinator? The native bees found in California do a much better job of pollinating. This program will tell you more about the differences between the European honey bee and our native bees, specifically the Blue Orchard Mason Bee. As gardeners, we can raise these gentle solitary bees, increase the bee population, and improve the health of our own yards at the same

You will want to bee there!





### **Bulb Lasagna- A Recipe For Beautiful Spring Blooms**

The layering of multiple bulbs in containers in order to increase the length of flowering time is a Dutch tradition known as bulb lasagna or sandwiching. Planting bulbs in this manner allows the early bloomers to push through to the top, the mid-spring bloomers to follow after. & the late-spring bloomers to provide you with a constant flow of months of color. Do not worry that they can't make it to the top – bulbs are sturdy and also rather narcissistic so they will do what they need to do to pop to the top and show off their colors.

You can do two-layer planting, but three-layer planting will give you a longer display. Start with really big containers for the most spectacular splendor; a 10-inch-deep container will hold two layers while a 14 inch deep container will hold three. You will want to crowd the bulbs for this method of planting, unlike

spacing them when planting directly into the earth. Drainage is of vital importance, so make sure there is a hole in the bottom of your container, with a layer of gravel across the bottom. Then apply a 2 to 3 inch layer of potting soil, with a handful of bone meal sprinkled on top. That is the "sauce" of your lasagna and should be at least 11 inches below the rim. The first layer of "pasta" will be the bulbs that bloom latest in the season, largesized bulbs such as Daffodil, Allium, Lilies, or Tulipa 'Giuseppe Verdi'. Parrot and fringed tulips will be the first to go into the container, with midseason Narcissus and mid-season Tulips, Hyacinth, and Galanthus in the center; the top layer will contain the earliest bloomers such as Snowdrops, Crocus, and Muscari.

Now add more "sauce" by topping off the first layer of bulbs with 3 inches of soil: sprinkle on more bone meal. The second layer of "pasta" should be bulbs planted about 6 inches below the surface of vour container such as Dutch Hyacinth or Jonquil Narcissus. Cover with a good inch of soil and yet another handful of bone meal. For your top layer, you will want to plant Crocus, Scilla, Ixia, Freesia and Grape Hyacinth. Top this with 5 inches of soil, and then add the "cheese" for your lasagna, the mulch. Water deeply at time of planting, and regularly thereafter, then sit back and enjoy the show.

### For SoCal Veggie Gardeners, Fall's Warm Soil Makes This a Fabulous Time to Plant

Fall is prime planting time in Southern California. The bugs are fewer, water demands lighter and the plants happier, if they're the cool-clime varieties that prefer mild SoCal winters. Choose a spot with at least eight hours of sun. Clean up any garden debris that could harbor disease or pests and amend the soil with compost or aged manure. If you're using pots, start with fresh soil. (Put the old soil in your compost pile.) Don't over water because that leads to rot in cool temperatures. Push your finger about an inch into the soil, and water only if it feels dry.

Here are 10 cool-weather vegetables to plant now.

#### 1. BEETS

Beets grow well from seed, so try a mix of colors planted in monthly intervals to stagger your harvest. Thin to 3

inches apart, but it's easier to just space the seeds when you plant to get full formed beets



because you

know you won't get out there to thin.

### 2. BROCCOLI

These are prolific producers and easy to grow from nursery starts. They're the vegetable that keeps on giving, producing in maybe six months. Plant broccoli deep — beyond the second row of leaves — so their stems grow straight and sturdy.

### 3. CABBAGE

Slow growers that take up a lot of space (about 2 feet square)

They need to be well spaced too.



Unlike other vegetables, cabbages will wait a bit to be harvested, unless it turns hot.

### 4. CARROTS

Carrots need a loose, stonefree soil to thrive. Stick to shorter varieties if you can't provide 12" of the ideal soil or you want to grow in containers. Carrots also grow best from seed. Expect to thin unless you space when you plant. (See beets.)

### 5. KALE

This leafy *brassica* is both tasty and attractive, a perfect pick for edible landscapes. Kale gets big, so make sure containers are 10 inches deep, one plant per pot.

### 6. LEAFY GREENS

Lettuces, spinach, arugula, chard, mustard and other tasty salad fixings all thrive in cooler temperatures. Warning: Do not to plant too many seeds at once....make successive plantings every few weeks, and expect your first harvest within a month.

#### 7. ONIONS/GARLIC

Onions require a specific amount of daily sunlight to make a bulb. Any variety works for bunching onions, known as scallions. "Candy" variety is recommended. Plant

garlic cloves pointy end up. Cut off the "scapes" (leafless flower stalks)

to create larger heads, and use them



for cooking. Harvest around June.

### 8. **PEAS**

Peas germinate slowly, so don't give up. Provide a trellis or cage so they can climb. Peas do well in containers at least six to eight inches deep and 16-18 inches wide.

### 9. POTATOES

Cut seed potatoes into chunks with two eyes each and let them dry for two days before you plant. Make sure tubers are always covered with soil. (Sun exposure makes the skins green and toxic). Harvest new potatoes when the sprawling plant blooms, mature potatoes when the plants die down. "Yukon Gold" is a versatile favorite.

### 10. **RADISH**

Add color and snap to winter with spicy, quick-growing radishes. Plant in intervals for a continuous crop. Easy to grow in pots 16" wide and at least 4" deep.

Pick radishes as soon as they mature; left too long in



the ground they turn woody, "overly pungent."
