

The preliminary plan is to visit a T&T-first, Devil Mountain Wholesale Nursery, and then Plant Depot and Tree of Life Nursery which is a particularly popular request.

For our February SJC nursery crawl, we will carpool as usual from St. Catherine of Sienna Parish, and we appreciate our drivers. Therefore, in the next garden club year, we will plan our visit at a more optimal time and then take sign-ups earlier than usual, at the prior month's general meeting.

January Trips & Tours - The Ecology Center

he January T&T kick-started 2025 with an enthusiastic and curious crowd of 34 day-trippers touring **The Ecology Center** under the auspices of Johnny Wilson, Farm Manager. Many thanks to all our carpool drivers, some of whom are new members.

Located in San Juan Capistrano on a historic agricultural property, we walked the pathways of the Market Garden, a two-acre farm within the farm, employing a Parisienne farm growing emphasis focused



on growing 60 chef driven ingredients every day. We saw the rows of crisp greens and fennel, varieties of dormant peach trees in the Fruit Forest, sunflowers and other blooms, all in contrast to the urban sprawl surrounding the farm. Beyond the Market Garden were the tractor-style fields of larger volume, less diverse, crops, currently strawberries and brassicas.

We learned of the history of the land, the prior farming families of the area, the establishment and growth of The Ecology Center. We learned of their mission, their regenerative farming practices, their future plans for a bio-regional seed initiative launching soon with a seed lab and for a cut flower stand where half the Market Garden will become a flower garden in the March timeframe. We also had the opportunity to meet two graduates of the Apprenticeship Program who were so capable and successful that they were hired full-time by The Ecology Center and to hear about the vision of this apprenticeship program.

And after our tour, with the rich topsoil dust on our shoes, after hearing-seeing-smelling The Ecology Center ethos, we topped it off with a literal farm-to-table lunch at their **Campesino Cafe** rounding out the full sensory experience. We filled the cafe tables with orders of wood fired pizzas, salads, egg toasts and sandwiches and pesto quinoa bowls, all of it vibrant and delicious. At the **Farm Stand**, of course we shopped: cool tees, veggies and other ingredients from the Market Garden, pantry items such as strawberry jam, half loaves of sourdough focaccia, chocolate chip tahini sesame cookies. Yum!



Our last stop was Seaside Growers Nursery, a gem

hidden down a driveway and across the train tracks. A unique aspect was that half the main area was reserved for shade plants and the other half for sun, and all well curated. Our members were busy finding treasures to pot up for their Valentine's planter creations and other unique specimens.

Winter in a bee's life as well as yours!

Photo Contest Rules

- 3. Renewed membership is required.
- 4. Photos must be **HIGH-RESOLUTION**. If using iPhone or Android when sending the photo, be sure to send the photo in "ACTUAL SIZE" not small, medium, or large. Minimum photo size of 4,000 KB is required.
- 5. The win the **FRONT** cover contest, the photo must be **horizontal or square**.
- 6. To win the **BACK** cover contest, the photo must be **vertical or square**.
- 7. The entry must be a **recent** photo of some part of the member's garden.
- 8. By submitting the entry, the member declares that he/she owns the rights to the photo.
- 9. Entries will be judged by the Board by the end of the club year.
- 10. The winner's photo will be featured on the front and back cover of the 2025-26 Membership Book.

NOTE: We encourage a variety of photos, including but not restricted to garden settings or features, mass plantings, and flowers.

Submissions should be sent to Perry Stampfel via email. You will receive a reply confirming that your photo has been received.

Broken China Mosaic Green Thumb

n Friday, January 17, one of our new members, **Sharon Stephens**, hosted a class on how to make a mosaic tile from pieces of broken china (Pique Assiette) and other pieces of glass, pottery, jewelry, or figurines. Sharon has been creating gorgeous pieces of mosaics for ten years, which adorn her spacious yard, pool area, and atop fence posts. The worktable was set with 10 stations plus her demonstration area. Safety is important so protective eyewear was provided along with all the tools we needed. After a short introduction on how to use the tools, called nippers, we all moved over to the area where the breaking of plates would happen. A plastic bag keeps the shards in one location, and to keep a particular design on a plate intact, we were advised to cover the design with clear packing tape before we used the hammer to break the plate. Then we were set loose to create a design on a template so that it could be transferred to the quarry tile when the design was ready. Nippers in hand we went to work. When our individual designs were ready, Sharon showed us how to mix the thin set and slather it like icing on the quarry tile. Sharon offered sound advice and helpful tips to each of us individually as she roamed from student to student, like a born teacher. Each of us created a gorgeous piece to take home. Most of us were there for 4.5 hours.







