

Inspiring the Next Generation of Gardeners through Sustainable Horticulture

rofessor Ken Lee is the Chair of the Department of Sustainable Horticulture and Landscape Design at Saddleback College. After working in the landscape design industry and teaching part-time for over 35 years, he



decided to pursue his passion for teaching and mentoring students full time. Since 2012, he has been offering courses in sustainable horticulture and landscape design at Saddleback College inspiring many of our LBGC scholarship recipients.

Dr. Lee has played a leading role in many college activities, including curriculum development, online education and Career Technical Education (CTE). Currently he serves as Co-chair of the CTE Committee and CTE Faculty Liaison for the College. Voted Professor of the Year, and the President's Award for Distinguished Service, Professor Lee was honored to receive the Angel of The Earth Award by colleagues and students.

Professor Lee earned his bachelor's degree in landscape architecture from Seoul University, Korea, in 1980 and his master's degree in landscape architecture from Cornell University.

Professor Lee's professional architecture projects extend from South Korea to China, to the East Coast and across California, including village revitalization, playgrounds, performing arts centers and much more.

Garden Tours Leave Legacies

he history of Garden Tours is a rich one that spans all continents and eras. In the United States the famous White House Garden Tours were started by Patricia Nixon in 1973. The Biltmore Estate and its gardens opened for public tours in 1930 to support finances during the Depression. But the grandaddy of them all is the Chelsea Flower Show in

London! The origins go back to the society's first lavish outdoor entertainment party at its Chiswick Garden in 1827. The Chiswick Garden parties quickly established themselves as one of the principal



attractions of the fashionable season. As a huge



horticultural event and a key fixture in the social calendar with coverage by the BBC, it now reaches millions of

viewers. Currently the Chelsea Garden Show covers over 11 acres, The Great Pavilion alone is 3 acres and additionally has parking for over 500 buses. They limit ticket sales to 40,000 per day. (Ok Susan, when you read this don't swoon thinking about how to manage that!) The Chelsea Flower Show generates around \$6.5 million dollars each year and all these proceeds are directed toward good causes such as "Grow Your Own Campaign" to encourage people to grow their own food, and "Britain in Bloom" a competition that recognizes and celebrates efforts of towns and villages to maintain and improve green spaces.

The Laguna Beach Garden Club Gate & Garden *Tour*, with a 20-year history, raises funds for the club's work and fosters community by bringing people together to appreciate and learn about gardens. Nearly 100 years ago, the club's founders engaged in various projects such as Victory gardens during wartime, creating gardens for soldiers' recovery, and enhancing the city with trees. They were dedicated volunteers eager to improve their town and the lives of those around them. They understood that volunteering means doing for the good of others without asking for anything in return. The actual definition of volunteering is a service provided without the expectation of a reward. If you are getting something for it, it's just not volunteering. Little did the founders know they were living the ethos of "For the Good of the Hive".

Mother Teresa, 1979 Nobel Peace Prize winner awarded for her humanitarian work, believed that true fulfillment and purpose come from dedicating oneself to serving others and making a positive impact on the world. She made it sound so easy, if you have hands and a heart you can do it. But she had one more requirement of her volunteers, you had to come with a smile and with a spirit of cheerfulness.

I ask that we collectively contribute to making the 2025 Gate & Garden Tour the most successful tour ever and recognize the incredible efforts put in by **Susan Denton** to make this huge event come together.

- 4. Photos must be **HIGH-RESOLUTION**. If using iPhone or Android when sending the photo, be sure to send the photo in "ACTUAL SIZE" not small, medium, or large. Minimum photo size of 4,000 KB is required.
- 5. To win the **FRONT** cover contest, the photo must be **horizontal or square**.
- 6. To win the **BACK** cover contest, the photo must be **vertical or square**.
- 7. The entry must be a **recent** photo of some part of the member's garden.
- 8. By submitting the entry, the member declares that he/she owns the rights to the photo.
- 9. Entries will be judged by the Board by the end of the club year.
- 10. The winner's photo will be featured on the front and back cover of the 2025-26 Membership Book.

NOTE: We encourage a variety of photos, including but not restricted to garden settings or features, mass plantings, and flowers.

Niguel Botanical Preserve In Its Glory

n a gray, chilly, and lightly drizzling morning, sixteen daytrippers were rewarded with colorful blooming vistas, the fresh layered fragrance of cowboy sage cologne, and fresh mist on the honeyed blossoms of the Niguel Botanical Preserve.

We were also treated to a spontaneous tour led by Monty McDivitt, President of the Preserve, who called out the Latin species names often along with the common names of various plants.

He highlighted special aspects of some plants, such as the grape soda scent of a purple blossom and pointed out unique plants like the Catalina Island mountain mahogany, a rare species of the rose family, endangered in its original habitat of South Catalina Island by grazing pressures of introduced bison.

The Niguel Botanical Preserve, an 18 acre public garden, showcases plantings from the Mediterranean climate regions of the world, creating beautiful, sustainable environments with low water needs. These environments provide habitat for various species of birds and important pollinators, such as butterflies, hummingbirds and bees.

Monty declared that March is the best month to catch the garden's beauty and scent and indeed it was glorious! After our fortuitous tour, many of us decamped to the nearby, and appropriately, Mediterranean restaurant, Zesty Olives. Again club members were met with great service and hospitality by the owner of this family owned and run restaurant, and we enjoyed a zesty lunch.

It was a lovely day, lucky in many ways, and so delightful to welcome new members to our day-tripping tribe. *-Patty Gaffney*



Bienvenuto from Italy

My husband, Perry Stampfel, and I are spending the month of March in Tuscany, Italy. We are enjoying the amazing food, wine, countryside, mountain top towns, art, agriculture, and historical sites. We have experienced lots of different weather ups and downs, from rain, to icy gusty winds, to calm nearly 60° weather. We are about halfway through our trip so far, but I thought I would share a few photos of some of the places we've seen. As you know, Italy is a Mediterranean climate as is Southern California; however, this is definitely mountain country, where we are so far, and the temperatures are much more dramatic than where we live. But I noticed some of the flora in the is similar to what we see; they seem to like succulents and cactus grows profusely here.

We started in Pienza, the surrounding area of Multipuciano and Multicino are known for its amazing wine called Brunello. And this entire area is also known for its pecorino cheese, which can vary from the city to city and tastes different depending on how long it is aged. They definitely cook their pasta more all dente than I usually do, so I think I will change my ways once I return home.

We have taken advantage of three separate wine tasting tours so far. Each very different, one in a private castle, the second a private three course lunch, and a third in a very rustic small vineyard.

Perry is a terrific tour planner, among his many talents, so he finds many out of the way places that most tourists don't flock to. But of course we will also hit some of the "Must See" places that make Tuscany famous. Here are some highlights of our stops (besides the ones listed above); Siena, Monteriggioni, Radda in Chianti, Peccioli, Volterra, & Pisa. Still to come are Lucca, Florence, Bologna, Verona, Turin & end in Milan.

In two days we will be taking a tour of a marble quarry in Carrera (where Michelangelo procured his marble).
