

Flying pests bugging you indoors? Let spiders help. A few spiders in your home, quietly knitting in the corners, are a great, non-toxic way to control winged pests like mosquitoes, clothes moths, and flies. Usually, venomous spiders are very shy; the spiders you see spinning cobwebs in the corner are completely harmless to humans. Before you vacuum away that spider, check the pile of insect corpses below her web and recognize what a good job she's doing to protect you from flying pests. Sometimes, doing less means you are doing more to help the planet.

November Guest Speaker

Learning About The Field To Vase Movement

annah Muller will be speaking on the topic of "Designing with Dried flowers."

Hannah is a flower farmer and florist in Northern California. She harnesses the beauty of blooms to create everlasting works of art. Having been born and raised on Full Belly Farm in beautiful Capay Valley in Northern California, she leans into the legacy of the farm to let sustainability flourish. Full Belly grows over 350 acres of certified organic fruits, vegetables, animals and flowers. Fifteen acres are devoted to cut flowers, selling primarily through their farmers markets, to wholesale buyers, local stores and restaurant. Hannah creates floral arrangements that mimic the surrounding landscape using the fresh fruits, vegetables and flowers grown on Full Belly Farm to create unique and wild garden style designs for weddings and events. She also makes wreathes and textural



installations with the flowers they dry in Full Belly Farms' Wreath Room and incorporates dried flowers into her other designs along with fresh flowers. Over the last decade, she has helped to pioneer the Field-To-Vase movement in Northern California, reminding supporters of local organic farming to not only eat local produce but to enjoy locally grown flowers as well.

Hannah is the author of *Designing* with *Dried Flowers* and has been featured in *Sunset* magazine in June 2024.

Gardening 101 for November 2025

The topic for November will be: CALIFORNIA NATIVE PLANTS

We hope all participants of our last month's presentation on 'Soils' enjoyed the topic and benefitted from the presentation. Please join us after our November 14th LBGC meeting for our second Gardening 101 class. For interested members, we will meet after our regular meeting out in the patio area and the educational meeting will last for 30-45 minutes including questions. All sessions will be presented by Master Gardeners, **Ingrid Cebula**, **Wendy Grande**, **Nora Koenig**, and **Melissa Rapp**.

Southern California native plants are uniquely adapted to our region's climates, especially the warm, dry conditions characteristic of Southern California. These plants have evolved to thrive with minimal water, making them ideal for sustainable landscaping in an area often affected by drought. By incorporating native plants, gardeners can support local food webs and habitats, providing essential shelter and food for native birds, pollinators, and other wildlife. In doing so, native plant gardens help preserve biodiversity and the ecological balance that has developed over thousands of years.

Despite these benefits, there is still some resistance to using native plants in urban and suburban landscapes. Many people are accustomed to lush, green lawns and ornamental plants that require significant irrigation and maintenance, and they may view (often incorrectly) native gardens as less manicured or aesthetically appealing. Additionally, these plants often have specific soil, sunlight, and spacing needs. However, as awareness grows about water conservation, habitat restoration, and the importance of native ecosystems, native plants are being chosen more as both a practical and ecologically responsible choice for the future.

Please join us. Whether you have ever thought of yourself as California native plant fan or not, you might be surprised by what you learn. You might come away a fan!

And it makes us feel SO GOOD! Remember to open and stack them and bring only clean PAPER cartons with lids. They can no longer use the plastic ones.

In addition to our monthly egg carton drive, November is our annual food drive/money drive month. It's especially impactful this year as the Panty serves more than 300 families per day. Canned goods such as peanut butter, pasta sauce, canned fish, canned beans, dry pasta and beans and other vegetables are always welcome. And staples like ketchup, mustard and mayonnaise. Check the dates if you're pulling off your kitchen shelves and don't bring anything that's expired. You can also bring checks (made out to Laguna Beach Food Pantry) and cash and I will make sure these make it to the Pantry. Monetary donations are particularly welcome as the Pantry buys food wholesale making your dollars go further. Everything we do for the Pantry is appreciated so very much by their staff, volunteers and the families in need. LBGC is making a lasting impact in the lives of so many!

I am so proud of the wonderful designer that has been chosen by **Laguna Art Museum** to represent the **Laguna Beach Garden Club's** mission statement in her design. **Natalya Sokolenko** born and raised in Ukraine. She moved with her husband and 2 daughters to California in 2012.

Natalya obtained her Bachelor's and Master's degrees in International Economic Relations while in Ukraine. While taking care of her family and trying to make a career in the field office, she decided to pursue her childhood dream of studying fashion. She enrolled in the program at Saddleback College, where she has won several competitions with her designs. Being conscious of



the environment, she chose the path of Slow Fashion Slow fashion is a movement and approach to the fashion industry that prioritizes quality, ethics, and sustainability over speed and mass production. After she graduates, she would like to make zero waste garments or work



in a custom costume shop. Natalya is passionate about historical clothing and enjoys studying Ukrainian vintage folk clothing and embroidery. These traditions bring her knowledge and inspiration for her own designs. Each piece she makes has a story behind its creation.

Natalya studied the Laguna Beach Garden Club history on our website and then accompanied me to view a few of the parks we care for and to visit the Bee Mural. We sat down at the promenade for a cup of coffee, and I regaled her with all the incredible contributions that our club has made over the years to our community and beyond. With that input and our upcoming centennial looming large she decided to use the fashion of the 1920's to be her target.

Trips & Tours - October

The Gorgeous Getty Center

n a Wednesday of beautiful fall sunlight, twenty-five Daytrippers made the 90-plus minute drive to the Getty Center. For some of our club members, it was the first time visiting, and for others, it remains a favorite destination.

The Central Garden, opened in 1997, is a site-conditional art installation, designed by artist Robert Irwin (1928-2023). His design features a path meandering downhill beneath a canopy of London plane trees and crisscrossing a stream. The water flows from the amphora basin, and as it gains momentum, becomes louder as it travels to the bottom. Irwin's design puts the strolling visitor in intimate physical contact with densely planted floral beds evoking all the senses. The path opens to the vista of an azalea maze that appears to float beneath a waterfall cascading into a manmade pond.

Engraved on the floor of the Central Garden is a quote from Robert Irwin, "Always changing, never twice the same." This inscription reflects the artist's philosophy that the garden is a living work of art that will constantly change, evolving over years and even with the subtle Southern California seasons. On Wednesday, the fall colors were aflame.

Daytrippers sampled the lunch offerings at the cafeteria style Cafe alongside Getty Center employees and traipsed the travertine steps to explore the collections on display. Some of us found the cactus garden at the southern end of the campus, the silhouette of which mimics the downtown LA skyline. Others enjoyed the light filled paintings of Claude Monet's snowy Wheat stacks, and Vincent Van Gogh's Irises, or marveled at the colors and details of the illuminated manuscripts. Still others explored the lavish

18th century French decorative arts with the Rococo and Neoclassical furniture, porcelain and ceramics. We ended the day with a visit to the museum store before taking the tram back to the parking lot. While the drive home may have taken a couple of hours even in the carpool lane, Daytrippers declared the T&T a success, an inspiring day!




















October Meeting Scenes

With minimal care the succulents will root into the moss and the wreaths can last for a year or longer. Jeanne is self-taught and has quite a bit of experience, having led this activity for several years. The class brought together both new and long-time members who enjoyed the project and also getting to know each other.
