President's Message

Sowing the Seeds of Wonder in Our Gardens

all is in the air! Several liquid amber trees grow on the route of my morning dog walk, and I always take a moment to appreciate the useless beauty of the colorful, fallen leaves. While it's tempting to rake them up, one of the most valuable things you can do to support pollinators and other invertebrates is to provide them with the shelter they need to survive winter. Luckily, that's pretty simple; all you need to do is do less yard work. Remember that the best way to cut greenhouse gases and benefit your garden is to leave the leaves!

Leaves create a natural mulch that helps suppress weeds while fertilizing the soil as it breaks down. Mulching can protect the soil surface and help prevent erosion from rainfall. Mulch also helps moderate temperature extremes by keeping roots warmer during winter and cooler in summer, and helps retain moisture in the ground, which is especially useful during droughts.

Rake leaves off the lawn and leave them under trees and in flower beds. Choose an area to let be completely wild. For me, it is behind the cottage, which I have barricaded so my husband and gardener do not destroy crucial pollinator habitat. While

you are at it, don't deadhead native plants. Native insects and animals eat the seeds, and many native plants reseed year after year. Embrace an untidy garden!



New to LBGC - Gardening 101

The Garden Club has added a new item to our very interesting and informative monthly meetings. We would like to offer a "Gardening 101" series. Each month after our regular meeting there will be a short (perhaps 30 - 45 minutes) talk for those members who would like to attend. For interested members, we would meet immediately after our regular meeting out on the patio. Each month would cover a different topic. These sessions would be presented by three LBGC members who are also Master Gardeners, Ingrid Cebula, Nora Koenig, and Melissa Rapp. There will be a presentation and a time for questions.

Our first topic will be the most basic to gardening: SOIL.

Soil is much more than just 'dirt' under our feet. It's a complex, living system which we can help with good gardening practices. Good soil is the foundation of a thriving garden. It does more than anchor roots – healthy soil stores essential nutrients, it retains moisture and allows drainage, and it supports a vast community of microbes and other organisms. Though there are different types of soil (sand, silt, or clay) each has a structure, nutrient content, moisture, and biological activity that all work together to support plants. When soil is rich, loose, and balanced plants grow better.

This talk will explore how soil health can be built and maintained as well as garden practices which help improve your garden soil.

There will be a time allotted for questions and answers.

Please join us after the October 10th LBGC meeting for our first "pilot" class! No reservation is required, but we do need 10 members (or more) to participate.

Renewing the Soil Through Regenerative Agriculture

Renewing our soil is one method to address climate change, using an approach called regenerative agriculture. The goal is to enhance the soil health and increase its capacity to store carbon, manage water, and restore ecosystem health with practices such as no-till farming (to minimize soil disturbance), rotating crops, planting cover crops, integrating livestock into farming the farming system, and reducing reliance on synthetic additives. These steps help reintroduce rich nutrients into the soil and keep them there.


The farms with animals such a cattle and sheep nourish the soil by planting a rotation crop in specific areas and then grazing the animals in those areas. Animals benefit from this diet, while naturally stirring and fertilizing the soils as they feed. Larger ranches are following similar approaches by having their cattle graze in rotating plots.



Why is healthy soil important? It's all about the soil microbiomes – the bacteria, fungi, earthworms, and more that provide nutrients, carbon, and water to plants. Healthy soil is good for the crops we eat, and it sequesters carbon by absorbing greenhouse gases.

Introducing these practices can present challenges for some farmers and ranchers. New systems require financial investments, education, new materials, and transitional time. Because soil is a limited, nonrenewable resource and susceptible to erosion, many farmers are beginning to explore these practices the challenges. Healthy soil can be a significant carbon sink and play the same roles as forests do by capturing carbon and releasing oxygen. (taken from *Costco Connection* by Sheri Flies, April 2024)

A Sensory Trips & Tours Day

n a beautiful day, we took an easy drive to the Balboa Park in San Diego to explore a little further afield for our first Trips & Tours (T&T) of the garden club year. Our highlight destination was the newly renovated, historic Botanical Building in Balboa

Park. Built for the 1915-16 Exposition, along with the adjacent Lily Pond and Lagoon, the historic building is one of the largest lath structures in the world. The Botanical Building plantings include more than 2,100 permanent plants, featuring collections of cycads, ferns, orchids, other tropical plants, and palms including bromeliads enthusiastically putting forth long, eye-catching bloom spikes.

After more than a century of weather and wear, the historic Botanical Building has been carefully revitalized, bringing it back to its 1915 grandeur while incorporating cutting-edge updates. According to the Forever Balboa Park website, the once deteriorating structure, with its graceful arcades, Palladian windows, and long-missing romantic pergola, now stands proudly, enhanced with modern features. For the first time in its history, the building includes interior misters, state-of-the-art lighting, and new water features, creating an immersive and dynamic space for visitors.

Down the road, we whisked through the desert garden to bask in the colorful fragrance of the adjacent Inez Grant Parker Memorial Rose Garden. While not the peak of rose blooming season, we still feasted on a stunning display o

season, we still feasted on a stunning display of approximately 1,600 roses, including more than 130 varieties. The display was in theme with the tactile and scented experience that Danielle Dall'Armi Hahn of Rose Story Farm brought to our general meeting. Brand new member **Cheryl Garbett** shared that her favorite rose is the fragrant hybrid pink tea rose, Gemini, a lovely blend of cream and coral.

This garden is recognized as outstanding by several renowned organizations: Outstanding Rose Garden in the U.S.A. by All-America Rose Selections in 1978; Award of Excellence in 2003







from the World Federation of Rose Societies, and in 2014, named in the Great Rosarians of the World Hall of Fame.

For a literal feast, we lunched at Artifact in the Mingei museum. Our menu choices ran the gamut from artfully plated plant-based meals to spicy shrimp dumplings and an envyinspiring burger plate. Yum!

We topped off the day with a visit to the family-owned Walter Anderson Nursery where we ogled gigantic mounted Stag horn ferns and a balloon plant milkweed, Gomphocarpus physocarpus. This nursery offered so many options, and our happy purchases included a variety of scented native plants, uniquely shaped succulents plus the fall color of pretty purple salvia, vibrant yellow daisy like flowers and decorative kale. More yum!

The Daytrippers had a lovely, full sensory day, and the T&T duo looks forward to seeing more of you in the future.

The Laguna Beach Garden Club has also been included in a lucky group of Laguna Beach non-profits whose mission statement will be represented at an Upcycled Fashion Show that will take place on November 1st. This will be an extraordinary evening where fashion and sustainability unite in a dazzling display of creativity and environmental consciousness. This exclusive event will showcase innovative designs crafted from reclaimed and repurposed materials, transforming everyday objects into stunning, wearable art. Our designer this year is Natalya Solenko, an incredibly talented Ukrainian designer whose design will be a nod to our past and embody the glamour of the 1920's.

Help Track Monarch Butterfly Sightings To Aid in Saving Declining Population

In January 2025, the California State Parks Foundation, a nonprofit foundation released the 28th annual Western Monarch Count results, which found 9,119 monarchs over-wintered in the state -- the second-lowest winter population counted since the count started in 1997.

An evaluation by the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service anticipates that western monarchs have a 95% chance of being extinct by 2080. Climate change, habitat loss, pesticides and disease are the primary causes for the population decline, according to the foundation.

The foundation is asking the public to download the free "iNaturalist " app on their phones and start an account. To contribute, take a photo of a monarch butterfly or caterpillar and upload it to the app. You can also register to help with the Xerces Society's annual Western Monarch Count (WMC) community science initiative by clicking here.

By reporting sightings, the public can help with efforts to fund restoration projects and volunteer efforts to support monarchs. One effort is planting native plants that monarchs can source for nectar like milkweed, yarrow and coyote brush.

The foundation is also advocating for the western monarch to be listed as a federally threatened species.

More information about western monarch conservation efforts and the 29th annual Western Monarch Count, which starts in October, is available at https://westernmonarchcount.org.
